Waging the war on moth plants in 2024!

Moth Plant is one of Auckland's most noxious weeds. It can grow up to 8 metres high, has a sticky white sap which is a common irritant and smothers native vegetation.

In 2023, Wiri Business partnered with New Zealand Biosecurity Services Limited (NZBSL) to remove 7025 moth plants from the business district. Over 1000 pods alone were collected at BLENNZ Homai Campus!

We are partnering with NZBSL again in 2024 to help remove moth plant from our midst. NZBSL will approach Wiri businesses where moth plant may be prevalent and gain permission to remove the plants there and then. We ask for the cooperation of our local businesses to help rid this pest from our environment.

Hiringa: bringing the power of clean green energy to Wiri

As you travel down the expanse of Roscommon Road, you might have noticed that there's a shiny new Waitomo fuel stop that has recently opened. This is also home to Hiringa Energy, who are developing New Zealand's first nationwide green hydrogen refuelling network.

We chatted with Ryan McDonald, Head of New Business and Rachel Hopkinson, Project Engineer to find out more about Hiringa, how hydrogen works and the first steps towards a greener future.

Tell us about Hiringa and what you do.

Hiringa Energy make, move, store and sell green hydrogen for use in transport and industry.

Hiringa was founded in New Zealand in 2017 to enable large-scale decarbonisation in a commercially sustainable way, motivated by a desire to address climate change.

Hiringa is building green hydrogen production and refuelling infrastructure across New Zealand and Australia. The New Zealand refuelling stations provide coverage for the key heavy freight routes and are powered by renewable 'green' electricity.

How do you make hydrogen and how is it a clean, green source of energy?

Hydrogen is made onsite using the process of electrolysis. Electrolysis works by passing electricity through water (H₂O) to separate hydrogen (H₂) from oxygen (O₂). The plant will have the capacity to produce up to 400kgs of hydrogen per day initially, enough to fill 10 buses or trucks and is designed to be upgradable to supply up to 80 trucks/buses per day in the future. The electricity to operate the plant will come via a certified green power purchase arrangement and utilised during off-peak times to reduce stress on the electricity network; the water is supplied via the existing Wiri municipal water supply.

Once produced the hydrogen is then compressed and stored onsite before being dispensed into a heavy vehicle.

Hydrogen is a clean alternative to the fossil fuels we use in transport and industry. Each large diesel truck replaced with a hydrogen powered truck is equivalent to taking between 50-150 petrol powered passenger cars off the road.

How do you plan to grow the network?

Hiringa is partnering with Waitomo to open New Zealand's first four zero-emission heavy vehicle green hydrogen stations in the North Island – these will be in Palmerston North, Hamilton, Auckland (Wiri), and Tauranga – operational early this year with a further twenty throughout New Zealand by 2028. Once operational, hydrogen-powered heavy transport vehicles such as trucks and buses will be able to refuel at the stations in similar time to what they are used to if they were filling a diesel truck or bus.

An initial fleet of 20 zero-emission hydrogen-powered trucks has been purchased by Auckland based TR Group to operate on the network. Built to meet New Zealand regulations and the demanding road conditions, the trucks will be a high productivity alternative to the existing fossil fuelled road transport. Hyundai New Zealand is also bringing five hydrogen fuel-cell heavy-duty trucks to New Zealand, with one of these already in work for NZ Post using a temporary hydrogen refuelling setup.

Will the network just be for trucks?

The network will also be able to provide a fast and reliable source of hydrogen for multiple other applications including aviation, marine, construction, materials handling and stationary power.

Whilst the network is design principally to refuel heavy trucks and buses the stations will still be able to provide H35 (350barg) filling to passenger cars by mid-year.

Why was Wiri chosen?

Wiri was chosen as it is a logistics hub and a gateway to Auckland and Northland, it is also a key node in what is known as the "Golden Triangle" of freight, being Auckland, Hamilton and Tauranga, hence it is an important location for our current and future customers.

Wiri is one of the first four refuelling stations under construction - these four stations will cover 95 per cent of New Zealand's North Islands heavy freight routes.

What has Hiringa learnt from this development that they will take to the next site?

Given the refuelling network is the first of its kind in New Zealand, the process has really been about working with partners, suppliers, customers and



national and local government who are aligned with the vision to decarbonise. Having all parties working together has been key to ensure all aspects of the hydrogen infrastructure and hydrogen supply chain can successfully operate and achieve New Zealand's decarbonisation goals.

Interesting Facts

Hiringa is a Māori word meaning perseverance, energy, determination, inspiration, and vitality.

It takes roughly 10 litres of water to make 1kg of hydrogen.

Hiringa Energy is also working with Air New Zealand to advance the introduction of [next generation aircraft fuelled by hydrogen](#). This alliance will accelerate the development of hydrogen as a sustainable and renewable zero emission fuel for the airline.

Hiringa has also worked alongside Toyota and Emirates Team New Zealand to fuel the world's [first hydrogen powered chase boat](#) using a combination of cutting-edge marine design and technology.

In addition to the refuelling network, Hiringa is also designing a [Wind to Green hydrogen facility](#) in Taranaki to supply green hydrogen to Ballance Agri-Nutrients urea fertiliser plant.



Importance of Business Continuity Planning with Salter's Cartage

Business Disruption Case Study written by Maelstrom & Simplicity Consultants – experts in Business Continuity Planning (Abridged version). A big thank you to Ron Salter for sharing his story and learnings with us.

Salter's Cartage are experts in waste recovery solutions and are an industry leader in the recycling and hazardous disposal market. Services provided by Salter's Cartage include waste oil and workshop recycling; interceptor cleaning; vacuum truck services; spill response; shipping and marine fluid management; and specialist fluid storage management. Salter's is headquartered in Manukau, Auckland; has depots in Auckland, Feilding and Christchurch; and its operations also service the Pacific Islands.

Salter's Cartage has been in business since 1980. Over the last

40 years Salter's has expanded into a diverse group, now firmly established as a market leader in its areas of operation. Salter's is committed to providing environmentally sustainable solutions to address the challenge of transport, disposal, and recycling of hazardous waste.

The Salter's Cartage story

15th September 2015 started like every other day for Ron Salter. At 1:30pm Ron was sitting at his desk at the Manukau site when he heard a loud 'bang', an explosion. The shock wave from the explosion blew the windows in and the lifted the roof on the building he was working in.

Ron and his staff acted immediately. Emergency evacuations of all staff from the site were undertaken; the emergency services (Police, Fire and Ambulance) were called; and site was immediately cordoned off. Once these immediate actions had occurred, assessment of the situation revealed that the top of a 100,000-litre fuel tank was missing and eventually found 700 metres away.

A contractor who was conducting work on the top of the tank at the time of the explosion was thrown from the tank when the explosion occurred and tragically died from this incident.

The explosion impact extended beyond the Salters Cartage site causing damage to surrounding businesses including lifted roofs and damage to a neighbouring site storing brand-new cars.

The blast was felt in other areas beyond Wiri and Manukau; with reports of the blast being felt in Manurewa and Takanini. Police and WorkSafe New Zealand investigations were to follow.

Salters Cartage were required to immediately cease all operations at the Manukau site; and

shift operations to alternative locations. Ron couldn't shutdown his whole business due to

the extensive services provided by Salters Cartage across the North Island, so he had to quickly develop a plan to manage the extensive disruption to his business. This included arranging

for the collection of oil and bulk haul delivery; and shipping unprocessed waste materials to providers in the South Island for processing. The processing/ oil refinement had

to be conducted elsewhere as Salters Cartage couldn't do this themselves.

Ron didn't know it at the time, but it would be six months before the Manukau site could reopen.

We asked Ron what emergency and business continuity arrangements Salters Cartage had in place at the time of this incident. Ron was thankful that Salters Cartage had well-practised emergency evacuation procedures in place. Evacuation drills were regularly conducted.

Ron also highlighted the importance of insurance. Salters Cartage had comprehensive

public liability insurances which covered losses incurred by surrounding businesses also impacted by the incident. Insurances in place enabled Salters Cartage to re-build the business.

Salters Cartage had safety plans and procedures in place, but these were not enough to prevent what happened. We asked Ron what would Salters Cartage do, if you could go back in time to prepare yourself/or business better – What would you tell yourself to do?

Reflections

Salters Cartage will never be the same. Ron reflected on this incident and impact that it has had on his business and family. He believes that in telling his story other businesses might learn, and in turn, be better prepared and resilient should they experience any disruption to their businesses.

While there's no guarantee that Ron will remain incident free in the future, he acknowledged that having plans to manage a disruption can minimise the impact on your business if it does.

Ron asked the question: 'If you have an incident, who will stand by you?'

There are multiple stakeholders involved to support your business in an incident: Emergency Services, Insurance companies; the business community and wider community; staff and family. All play an essential role in supporting a business in any incident causing disruption.

Keeping the waterways clean – an update from Auckland Council

The Industrial and Trade Activity Proactive Programme (ITAPP) kicked off mid 2023 with the goal of preventing pollution of our waterways and educating businesses in the Puhinui catchment.

A total of 393 Wiri businesses were desktop reviewed within the Puhinui catchment area to confirm risk level, check for consents, and review previous compliance history. Of this number, 200 businesses were visited in person by the regulatory compliance staff, where it was determined that baseline compliance is sitting at just under 10%.

After providing these businesses with recommendations on how to reach stormwater compliance on their site, 90 have carried out changes and are now compliant.

The most common observation across businesses is the lack of spill kits and spill response plans.

These are required for all industrial and trade activity sites and are an important part in managing environmentally hazardous substances on site.

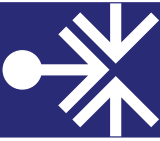

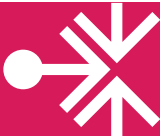
